MICKLEFIELD PARISH COUNCIL

Micklefield Parish Council usually meets on the first Thursday of each month, at 7.15pm. Every meeting begins with a public forum, at which members of the public can speak

(members of the public may not speak during the meeting unless invited to by the Parish Council). The Parish Council also has a Finance and Corporate Management Committee, which meets on the third Monday of February, June and October, at 7.30pm. All meetings are open to the public and notices of meetings, with an agenda, are posted on the community noticeboards at least three days before a meeting. Notices of meetings and copies of agendas and minutes are also available on the Parish Council's website. Please note that due to the cessation of legislation that allowed remote meetings and the continued closure of Leeds City Council buildings to third party bookings, the Parish Council's meeting venue cannot be confirmed until each meeting has been arranged.

PARISH COUNCIL VACANCIES

There are currently two vacancies on Micklefield Parish Council due to insufficient nominations at the election in May 2019. The council can fill the vacancies by co-option, which is a process whereby the council considers applications from interested persons and then selects someone to fill the seat. If you are interested in becoming a parish councillor, please write to the Parish Council and include a few details of why you would like to become a councillor. If you need any information about qualifications for being a councillor or just want more information about the role, please contact the Clerk to the Council.

FINANCIAL AUDIT

Yorkshire Internal Audit Services has undertaken the internal audit of the Parish Council's accounts for the financial year ending 31 March 2021, with no issues raised. The Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR) has been sent to the External Auditor, PKF Littlejohn LLP, and copies of the approved but unaudited AGAR have been posted in the public noticeboards and Parish Council's website, with a notice for the exercise of public rights.

The Parish Council has accepted a gift of a decorative Pit Wheel that commemorates the Peckfield Colliery disaster and which will now be maintained by the Parish Council. The Parish Council also gave a grant

This group was formed earlier this year with the three aims of reducing the carbon footprint, increasing the level of bio-diversity, and reducing the levels of pollution and waste, within the Micklefield Parish boundary. We have been feeling our way a bit in the first few months but have achieved the following:

1. Helping out with the scheme to create a wildflower garden in the Recreation Ground by clearing leaves and sowing some additional seeds.



2. Improving a neglected strip of land at the north entrance to the station and sowing annual wildflower seeds. They are doing well and we hope to have a spectacular display in the next month or two.



3. Helping to organise the reuse of stone planters to prevent illegal vehicle access onto a green space near the station. In conjunction with Incredible Edible Leeds the planters are being used to grow vegetables for anyone to use.

- 4. Lots of litter-picking around the village.
- 5. Developing plans to increase bio-diversity in other places around the village. We are gathering lots of useful information from many sources at present.

of £320.00 to the Parochial Church Council of St Mary the Virgin, Micklefield, towards a commemorative event for the 125th anniversary of the Peckfield Colliery disaster. The event was attended by Parish Council representatives, all three Ward Councillors, the Lord Mayor of Leeds, Micklefield Primary School choir and representatives, as well as residents, and was led by the Most Revd and Rt Hon Stephen Cottrell, Archbishop of York.

Parish Council members also liaised with Incredible Edible Leeds to assist in the formation of a project in Micklefield, which included working with Leeds City Council to secure permission to site planters on Leeds its land. In addition, the Parish Council donated several concrete planters to the Incredible Edible Micklefield project, which are being used by the Micklefield Community Green Group to grow produce that anyone can harvest and use. Micklefield in Bloom has upgraded its planters to self-watering ones and is organising a public drive to attract more members.

The Parish Council has representatives to other bodies and committees. Its representatives to the Peckfield Landfill Site Liaison Committee are Cllr J L Auty, Cllr D Backhouse and Cllr R M Czwarno, with Cllr D Brown as deputy. They attend meetings to raise complaints and problems with the operator, Leeds City Council and the Environment Agency. Its representatives to the Hook Moor Wind Farm Liaison Committee are Cllr J A Crossley and Cllr R M Czwarno.

AMENITIES

Two trees that were partially obstructing footpaths and one that was partially obstructing junction sightlines have been crown-lifted and reduced. H2H Contractors Ltd has been appointed to undertake the grass cutting and strimming on the public rights of way. Blast Contractors have been reappointed to remove waste from the bins in the recreation ground and Vandicourt playground and litterpick around the skate park. The Parish Council is also in the process of appointing a contractor to undertake routine maintenance work to the spring rocker and multi-play unit in Vandicourt Playground. Weather dependent maintenance, such as the removal of moss and algae from the wetpour surface at Vandicourt playground, and minor repairs to the skate park surface, are also planned. Play and recreational equipment is checked weekly by a qualified routine play inspector.

LIGHTING, ROADS, FOOTPATHS AND TRANSPORT

The Parish Council continues to pursue a project with the potential to lead to a cycle path between Micklefield and Garforth. The project is in its very early stages and requires permissions and agreements from various different organisations before it can be realised. If you want to help prevent dog fouling, details of specific locations and times of fouling

and persons responsible for leaving dog foul on the footpath would greatly help the Dog Warden Service to reduce the problem, so anyone with information should contact Leeds City Council via the online report form at www.leeds.gov.uk or on 0.113 222 4407. Problems with highways, including pot-holes, holes in, or damage to, footpaths and obstructions on roads and footpaths, from advertising signs to overgrown hedgerows, shrubbery or grass verges, should be reported to Leeds City Council on 0.113 222 4407, or via its website www.leeds.gov.uk. If you have any problems with streetlights in your area not working correctly, they can be reported to Leeds City Council on 0.113 222 4407, or via the Leeds City Council website. Dumped rubbish can be reported to Leeds City Council on 0.113 222 4406, or via the Leeds City Council website. Leeds City Council has 'Do it online' report forms on its website for all the above problems.

PARISH COUNCIL ACTIVITIES AND POWERS

Whenever it makes a decision to do something, the Parish Council must be sure that there is a law that supports this. If there isn't, then the Parish Council hasn't acted legally. If the Parish Council is not undertaking work that you think it should be, it might be because it does not have the legal power to do so.

.....AND FINALLY

Notices of all Parish Council meetings (ordinary and extraordinary), Committee meetings and meetings of the Trustee of Micklefield Recreation Ground Charity are posted in each village notice board and on the Parish Council website, at least three clear days before the meeting, as required by law. Though not a legal requirement, the Parish Council also posts an agenda of the business to be transacted at the meeting. Any other business of the Council, including legally required documents such as vacancy notices and audit notices, is posted in the Council's notice boards and on its website, so checking regularly can help you keep up with Parish Council activities.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENTS IN MICKLEFIELD

Well, I think now is a good opportunity for the Parish Council to say "Hello and welcome!" to our new residents who are starting to join us in the various large housing developments as they get built out and the village expands. 50 houses in the Persimmon Homes development around Garden Village are now occupied; 26 houses are occupied in the Barratt Homes development around Manor Farm; and 40 are now occupied in the Strata Homes development leading away from Grange Farm Court.

Avant Homes has already made a start on their 150 houses wrapping around Hallfield Avenue and St Mary's Walk; Taylor Wimpey will soon be starting to build 104 dwellings between Pit Lane and The Crescent; and there are another 44 houses to come when the Reserved Matters application for the Duchy Homes development at the North End of Old Micklefield eventually gets approved (which it will in one form or another).

For now, that's about it on the release of approved housing allocations for development—everything was kept at bay for over 20 years from when the UDP housing allocations were first published in 1993, but now it seems as if everything is happening all at once. And that's because it is!

To be clear though, there are no other approved housing allocations that would expand the village further into the Green Belt beyond what has now become the settlement boundary. That's it, for now, but Micklefield Parish Council will continue to monitor very closely any new proposals for new housing allocations that might start emerging from Leeds City Council when it does its next Site Allocations Plan.

All the large housing developments we are now seeing are on land that was taken out of the Green Belt in 2001—a highly contentious decision, arising from the UDP Inquiry in 1995—but that isn't the fault of the new residents moving into those houses. They're just people who have all made a positive choice to come and live in Micklefield, so let's all make them feel welcome and encourage them to stay and become involved in our local community.

In the meantime, there have been all sorts of other ad hoc planning applications for the Parish Council to consider: a born-again fish shop (withdrawn and switched to 2 flats); householder extensions both upwards and outwards; and the latest one, a 60 feet high 5G monopole facing the seat on Churchville Drive. Who knows what will get submitted next as a proposed development to surprise us all......

MICKLEFIELD RECREATION GROUND CHARITY

Micklefield Recreation Ground is a registered Charity (registered with The Charity Commission) that is managed by Micklefield Parish Council as the Sole Trustee of the Charity. The Trustee of Micklefield Recreation Ground Charity meets on the third Monday of January, March, May, July, September and November, at 7.30pm. Meetings are open to the public and notices and agendas of meetings are posted on the community notice boards at least three days before a meeting. Notices of meetings and copies of agendas and draft minutes are also available on the Parish Council's website. Please note that due to the continued closure of Leeds City Council buildings to third party bookings, the Trustee's meeting venue cannot be confirmed until each meeting has been arranged.

ANNUAL ACCOUNTS

Yorkshire Internal Audit Services has undertaken an independent examination of the charity's accounts for the financial year ending 31 March 2021. The Charity will submit its annual return and annual report to the Charity Commission, in accordance with charity law.

FACILITIES

There have been delays to the full repair of the zip-wire (which was damaged last year when the seat and chain were ripped from the cable trolley, damaging it irreparably) but the unit should be fully functional within the coming weeks. The post and rail fence around the football pitch was vandalised and despite the difficulties in obtaining some of the materials needed, it has now been repaired. Similarly, the ball-stop fencing was damaged, resulting in two panels falling off and needing to be reinstalled at short notice to prevent their theft and further vandalism.

As a further addition to the available amenities, the Parish Council has agreed to seek funding to buy and install three new seats in the recreation ground near the southern perimeter. The wildflower meadow is coming into bloom and can be enjoyed from the seats at the centre of the meadow quadrangles.

Government regulations restricting or banning grassroots group sports have been eased and both of the clubs that let pitches on the recreation ground have recommenced their league games. Additional matches have been played on weekday evenings and the letting season was extended to accommodate the remaining league matches. This allowed the clubs to finish off their seasons.

DOG WALKING

Dog walking is a recreational activity and is therefore not banned from the Recreation Ground. 
